# It's Shoebox Time!

y husband, Bobby, and I just returned from a trip to the Billy Graham Library in Charlotte, North Carolina. Touring the library was a wonderful experience. What made the day so extra special was that it was Biker's Day. Over 1,000 bikers from the southeast came bringing their boxes for Operation Christmas Child. The large parking lot was filled with motorcycles. In one area was a huge mountain of filled shoeboxes – over 6,000 in all. They were being packed into shipping cartons and loaded onto the back of a tractor trailer. There were all kinds of events taking place specifically for the bikers, but Bobby and I snuck over long enough to hear the testimony of their full circle speaker. (A full-circle speaker is someone who received a shoebox as a child, & testifies how much it meant to them.) We heard from Vladimir, who was born in the Ukraine. He was one of nine children. The family was extremely poor as his father was an underground preacher. Because of his faith, it was difficult for his father to hold a job. The children only had a couple pairs of shoes to share amongst themselves. They also had to share a toothbrush! However, one day, each of the nine children received a shoebox. Vladimir was thrilled to receive his own toothbrush, a yo-yo (which was a status symbol) and some toy cars. Up to that point, he and his brothers had used their shoes as imaginary cars. He was delighted to receive a bar of soap; it smelled so good! (I couldn't help but think if any of our kids received a bar of soap for a Christmas gift, I don't think they would have been as thrilled as he was!) There was one gift, though, that left him baffled. It was dental floss. He came to the conclusion that since it had a minty taste, it must be some sort of candy. He thought, "Those Americans have a strange way doing candy!" It wasn't until years later, after they had come to America and he had his first dental visit, that he discovered what it was. Dear church family,



reetings in the precious name of our Lord, Jesus Christ. It was 500 years ago on October

31, 1517, that an obscure monk in the Roman Catholic Church, wrote a paper with 95 reasons why he believed the sale of indulgences was wrong. It was known as the "95 Theses." It set off a chain reaction and a firestorm that has divided the Christian world ever since. He said, "If I can be convinced from Scripture, I will recant."

The Roman Catholic Church had despoiled Italy to build St. Peter's cathedral in Rome and now they were doing the same in Germany. Indulgences were pieces of paper (that they sold for lots of money), that said the souls of departed loved ones could get out of purgatory or even hell. It was said "As the coins fall and jingle in the coffers, their souls fly up." Luther was convinced that the pope had no authority to make such a claim, and that it was immoral to extort money from those to whom the worthless paper was sold.

The matter of indulgences was a big issue in 1517, but in the light and perspective of history, it was Martin Luther's rediscovery of the gospel of the Bible that (cont. on page 2)

has transformed Christianity. The early church understood and preached it, but somehow it got lost over the centuries of the Middle Ages.

"The Just Shall Live by Faith" was the watchword of the Reformation. The transformational message of "Faith in Christ Alone" was what finally released Martin Luther from his painful struggle of being accepted by a holy and just God. All the works that his church told him to do had never brought peace to his soul.

He was 21, nearly a doctor and being ordained as a Roman Catholic priest, when he found a book in the library – a Bible. It was a Latin Vulgate Bible! He was trained in Latin so he could read it - but he had never even seen a Bible up until then! He studied and read it and started preaching it. It was through preaching a series on the book of Romans, that he (re) discovered the simplicity of the gospel by faith alone in Jesus. When God saved his soul, He also opened his eyes to all the abuses of the RCC, that so clouded the truth. Martin Luther set out to stay within and to reform the RCC, but that would not happen. The differences were so great that nothing but a clean break and a brand new start would do. And thus was born the Protestant Reformation.

Others before Martin Luther had come along with the same message, but most had been executed or martyred for even speaking up. A combination of events changed that. First was the invention of the printing press in 1453, and the possibility of mass printing of the Bible and other literature as well.

Second, in God's providence, Martin Luther was protected from being killed. He was hidden for nearly a year in a secluded castle, out of harm's way. During that year, Martin Luther translated the New Testament into German. That was his native tongue and soon it was being read throughout the land. Like the King James Bible united the English speaking world, so Luther's German Bible united the German speaking peoples Europe. It is hard to over-estimate the historical changes that have occurred because of those two translations of the Bible.

Martin Luther wanted every man and woman to read the Bible for themselves. All of the tenets of the Protestant Reformation came out of a fuller understanding of God's Word. Over the centuries, certain practices of the church had become nothing more than empty meaningless rituals. In the midst of this darkness the Reformers sought define Christian doctrines. especially those related to salvation. The Five Basic Beliefs were...

- 1. By faith alone
- 2. By scripture alone
- 3. Through Christ alone
- 4. By grace alone
- 5. Glory to God alone

These simple truths that may seem obvious to us were revolutionary years ago. 500 The Pone summoned Luther to answer the charge of heresy and even promised him safe passage to and from the council. Luther went, even though he knew he would probably be executed. He bravely said that unless he was convinced from Scripture, he would not recant anything. "Here I stand. I cannot do otherwise. So help me God.

Amen." Soon thereafter, he was excommunicated (kicked out of the RCC and supposedly from heaven) and an edict was handed down that commanded all to take him prisoner and prohibited printing, buying, or selling of any of Luther's writings. So much for safe passage. This edict hung over him until his death 35 years later.

At that time, there were many other reformers who risked their lives to establish these truths in the world. For example, John Wylcliffe in England (!380's), and John Hus in Czechoslovakia, who was burned at the stake in 1415. We stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us. Praise the Lord for all that God has done to buy our salvation, through Christ's shed blood on the cross of Calvary. And praise the Lord for those who have sacrificed so much to keep that message pure and make it available to whosoever will believe in Christ. alone.


